Barbara Ackerman Named President Emeritus of EECA

Retired School Counselor, Barbara Ackerman, in recognition of her contributions to education and the school counseling community, has been named President Emeritus of the East End Counselors Association, the first in the Association's history.

Barbara was honored at our spring meeting on June 7, 2023. She is the first member of the East End Counselors Association to receive this honor.

Barbara retired as the School Counseling Director of Southold Schools in 2002, having served the children of Southold for over 16 years. Since her retirement, she has served as a consultant to the Executive Board of the East End Counselors Association. Over the years, Barbara served the Association in many roles,

Barbara will mark her 21st year of retirement this August. Her retirement has been an active one. Aside from her untiring contributions to the school counseling profession, Barbara is an active member the Southold Rotary Club of Southold where she has served as District 7255 Assistant Governor, Scholarship Chairperson and in other roles that promote the organization's primary goal of encouraging civic responsibility and promoting peace through international programs to aid those in need.






EECA Honors Administrative Assistants
